These are always popular and busy events and provide an ideal opportunity to meet some of the committee and residents and to hear what life in an Abbeyfield House is really like.

St. Mary's House have been kept very busy recently with birthday parties.

First to celebrate was one of our more recent residents, Miriam, who has reached the wonderful milestone of 95.

St. Mary's newest resident, Evelyn, recently gave an excellent talk at the Wednesday coffee morning about her experiences in Romania.



As part of a church group who provide financial and practical support she had travelled out to a small village near the border to carry out repair work to an orphanage and to assist however necessary. As well as telling us all about the experience she had a full album of photos to pass around and was able to bring the people in the photographs to life with her descriptions of them.

St. Mary's most recent talk was by their house treasurer, Steve, who has not long returned from almost

two months touring Australia with his wife. His talk was accompanied by a large map so that the residents could follow the route easily and illustrated by a slide show on DVD.

Sibley's Orchard also have regular coffee mornings on a Tuesday., although they do not usually have a guest speaker.



The coffee mornings are hosted by a volunteer, Paula who comes in every Tuesday during term time, and the house manager joins them when she can as do other committee members from time to time.



As regular readers will know our houses could not exist without the

hard work of our volunteers. However this effort is not entirely one way. As you will see from the picture below age is no barrier to helping others.



Kath (who came to Abbeyfield when she moved back to England from South Africa) and who is one of the most long-standing residents from Annett House has been knitting comfort blankets for children in hospital for some years and has now completed hundreds.

The blankets are knitted in bright colours to a specified size and then sent to a central distribution depot so that they can be dispatched to hospitals as needed. They are designed to be given out to children when they come in to hospital and they are then able to

take them home when they leave. Obviously this means that a constant supply is required from Kath and others like her.
